Cherokee national election.

Plaintiffs' underlying claims assert that Defendant has wrongfully removed their status as Cherokee citizens, and that the March 2nd Constitutional Amendment changing citizenship requirements for the Cherokee Nation was flawed and cannot be enforced. Should Plaintiffs ultimately prevail, and no injunction were to be entered, they will have been improperly expatriated from the Cherokee Nation for a period of time, and will have been denied one of the most fundamental rights of a citizen - the right to vote for governmental leaders.


Upon weighing the positions of each side, and finding agreement of the parties, the Court finds, orders, adjudges, and decrees that Defendant, Lois Ummersteckee, shall immediately reinstate to full citizenship within the Cherokee Nation the Plaintiffs and all similarly situated persons commonly known as "Cherokee Freedmen." This order shall remain in effect until the Court reaches a decision on the merits of Plaintiffs' claims in these actions, or until further order.
